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## We Don't Know What We Don't Know

Growing up in a middle class family in a small town, I did not have much exposure to the struggles and challenges of the poor and disadvantaged. Of course we had our own challenges. Alcohol abuse was prevalent in my community, but viewed as normal behavior. I watched my parents lose my childhood home, due to a business loss, as I was entering adulthood and beginning a life on my own. But, growing up I always knew that there would be a roof over my head and food on the table. Naively I assumed all families were similar to mine. Despite the trials we faced, we had our faith and each other; I always felt secure and loved.

In 2012 I began volunteering at Samaritan House and I felt an immediate connection. The program is based on Christian principles, to love thy neighbor, to help those less fortunate, to treat others the way you would want to be treated, and my favorite – give someone a fish and you feed them for a day, teach them to fish and you feed them for a lifetime. Growing up I never realized how disadvantaged some really were. I never understood why they behaved the way they did or the choices they made. They may not have had parents who loved them, protected them from harm, and taught them how to live a happy, secure and peaceful life. For some, the complete opposite is their reality and self-preservation drives their behavior. I am learning to not be judgmental, for I have not walked in their shoes.

In 2015 my role shifted from volunteer to employee. While I felt a passion for the work that is done here; there was also a conflict. Samaritan House was founded by a pastor and based on Christian principles, but, the need for greater funding than the community could support, made it necessary to seek and receive partial government funding to keep the doors open. While it may be less than ideal to need this support, I have been reminded time and time again that God provides in many ways. This year, for the first time since being affiliated with Samaritan House, I have come to accept this. I see His hand in this provision. At the beginning of the pandemic, monetary and in-kind support through private donors, churches, and grants diminished greatly but we had our 50% base funding from HUD. They also provided funding for COVID related expenses that were above and beyond normal operations. The PPP loan filled in the gap to cover staffing. Without this broad availability of support, we may not have been able to continue serving. We don't know how long this extra provision will be available, but it has been valuable in helping make up the difference while private donations have diminished and COVID expenses have increased. We realize that during this time, most, from all economic backgrounds, are facing trials and there is a level of uncertainty throughout the nation as a whole. I am now thankful for what I used to despise and know that God can use all circumstances for His glory.

Over the years, I have written stories regarding how I feel about the women and children who come to Samaritan House seeking a better life. I have reprinted poems which I felt 'spoke to me' in a special way and were applicable to our clients. I would like to share another; one that has stayed with me since childhood.

#### If I Were a Sunbeam

... If I were a sunbeam, I know what I'd do, I would seek white lilies, rainy woodlands through. I would steal among them, softest light I'd shed, Until every lily raised its drooping head.

*If I were a sunbeam, I know where I'd go, Into lowliest hovels, dark with want and woe: Till sad hearts looked upward, I would shine and shine, Then they'd think of heaven, their sweet home and mine.* 

Art thou not a sunbeam, child, whose life is glad With an inner radiance sunshine never had? O, as God hath blessed thee, scatter rays divine! For there is no sunbeam but must die or shine. By Lucy Larcom '1882'

When I was a very little girl, I thought the second line in the second verse said, 'Into lonely hollows where there's want and woe.' I pictured a poor, isolated Appalachian area where oppressed families lived in various stages of poverty. I realized much later that I was wrong about the wording but not entirely wrong about the concept. I imagined myself a little sunbeam going from dark place to dark place and spreading light (sort of like *Tinker Bell)*. And, it easily relates this 'spreading the light' to what we all try to do for those living at the shelter.

This poem has even more meaning for me, as it was one of my dad's favorites. He passed away two months before my first child was born. He never got to see any of my children here on earth. This child, whom I named Michael, not yet born before his grandfather's death, suffered a fatal heart attack forty-one years later and was sadly taken; way before his time. White lilies, like in verse one, just happened to be his favorite flower and he planted them wherever he lived. Lilies with raised heads are engraved on his tombstone.



I like to believe they will meet someday, my dad and Michael, and perhaps wait together among white lilies for those of us who remain to scatter rays divine!
